Landscapes using different media

Figurative	Art work which is made to look like the real person, object or scenery.
Horizon line	A line which runs left-to-right across the page.
Impressionism	The 'impression' of what the person, object, light or place looked like, rather than exactly what it looks like.
Landscape	Natural scenery.
Post Impressionism	An art movement that developed from impressionism. Artists often used bright colours and short brush strokes to express their thoughts and feelings.
Representation	Portraying someone in a particular way.
Shading	Drawing darker pencil marks to show darker tones.
Tones	The lightness or darkness of something.


